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## From The Dog House - with Brendan Butler



One of the frustrating problem's of starting young work dogs that we regularly encounter is, they are often either to soft and placid and lacking

maturity and confidence, or the opposite, and are to hard, fast and uncontrollable. The good news is that there are drills to help with both categories.



In last months Toora Bungles we looked at a drill to help give a soft dog confidence to walk up on stock, and that they often mature into calm and smart workers. With the hard, fast,

immature dog, we need to slow them up and get them out off their stock. These dogs are often hard to control and won't listen to commands, but when well trained can get a lot of work done and really move stock.

My preference is to start in a small yard, preferably round, so that the dog has to circle around. If the dog is too revved up stock if it settles down and steadies up. to bring the sheep toward me, I will let it keep circling around the sheep with me in the middle. I then keep putting my body pressure on or behind the dog to make it uncomfortable.

As the dog starts to tire, we can step in front and get it to stop. We can then step out and let the dog have the stock back again, maybe this time circle back the other way. If the dog starts to go hard again we stop and repeat the process as many times as is needed. Continue this drill until the dog starts to realise that it's only going to get the

While we are letting it circle, we are telling it in a stern voice "steady up ". Once the dog is calmer we can move away from the sheep it should start to bring the sheep towards us.



This drill can be repeated as many times as necessary until the dog realises he is not going to get the sheep unless he's going steady.

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### Tooraweenah Preschool, 'Developing Wings of Independence' With Marie Gale (Jacobsen)

What an amazing Term 3 we had with our fabulous preschool friends! We welcomed new preschool friend Lottie and her family and we have had a fun time playing with Lottie during her first few days.

We have been getting ready for the Tooraweenah Show that is on in the holidays and we can't wait to see our Preschool display in the pavilion. We made all sorts of amazing artworks and constructions, including butterfly printing, golf ball printing, painting ourselves, string painting, building constructions with Mobilo and Duplo, and even decorating hard boiled eggs for the 'preschool competition' using bright coloured textas. There will also be wonderful photos on display.

We enjoyed playing some fun games throughout the term with 'Ready, Set, Go!' Occupational Therapy Program. Skills were developed through fun activities around Balance and Co-ordination in Movement; Eye/Hand Co-Ordination; Motor Planning; Upper Body Strength and Stability; and Fine Motor Skills. We had fun doing hurdles, up and over games, wheelbarrow races, puzzles, constructions, lots of balloon games, pouring water into bigger and smaller containers, backwards and forwards runs and bowling games, just to name a few! We enjoyed challenging ourselves with these special activities.

On the last day of Term 3 we were very excited to host a combined "Tooraweenah NAIDOC Cultural Day"



with Tooraweenah Public School friends and our special visitor, Ms Karen Andriske from Dubbo. It was such an amazing day, with everyone having a great time



learning from "Aunty Karen" about Aboriginal Culture, joining in to do the fun activities she had brought with her. We learnt about Aboriginal Culture and customs through stories read to us by Aunty Karen, Mrs Smith and Miss Marie, and we also did some amazing activities together. We worked together in preschool as teams, the TPS (school) and TPS (preschool).

We made our very own Aboriginal flag with collage, especially highlighting the yellow sun. We used the rocks that we collected during our Bush Preschool adventures and painted these carefully, using dot painting after checking out some Aboriginal art that used this style.

We got creative and carefully screen printed pictures of Australian animals on calico squares. We are going to use these and make a special preschool wall hanging - but first, you just might see them at the show in our display! We worked as a team to do this: one friend held the stencil carefully while the other friend did the screen printing.

While we were busy with these craft experiences, Aunty Karen was busy cooking for us in the staff room. She cooked Johnny Cakes and Emu Sausages for us to taste-test. Everyone enjoyed them – lots of friends went back for more as they were so nice, and friends really liked having a taste of the emu sausages – or maybe it was because they were on little toothpicks?? We painted wooden boomerangs

using Aboriginal art styles; and made a 'Sea of Hands', decorating a handprint and planting them together in the name of friendship and unity.

We discovered our 'short' didgeridoo is actually an Emu Caller, we then made our own using cylinders, and decorated them. We watched Aunty Karen hold them vertically then tapping the top to make an 'emu' sound. These will be a fun school holiday game for friends I'm sure! This was a very exciting discovery and friends were thrilled to make their own!

What an amazing day and a fabulous experience for us all! Such a great day of learning and fun – we hope that Aunty Karen will come and visit us again for more wonderful learning and fun together, we learnt so much.

We always enjoy Bush Preschool on alternate Wednesdays and Fridays.

Thank you to the parent and family helpers for joining us on these fun adventures 'outside the gate'.

The children have loved creating 'stone cities'. The addition of our butterfly nets, have been perfect for catching tadpoles and some 'sleepy' yabbies at the creek, adding to our knowledge and understanding of the natural world and the creek environment. Children have noticed how much the creek has 'emptied' and how much 'grass' is growing there. We have seen yabbies, lots of tadpoles – which we've checked each week to see if they have grown. We spotted leeches, beautiful birds and even several bearded dragon lizards along the way!

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
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
